20/21 is an Assessment Year

Standing Rule 21-Bylaws states:

Active Members are required to support the annual benefit obligation wit the purchase of two (2) event tickets. Sustaining members are required to support the annual benefit with the purchase of one (1) event ticket. In an off-benefit year, there will be an assessment equal to the cost of the prior year benefit ticket obligation.

Since this is an off benefit year the assessment will be \$260 for active members and \$130 for sustaining members. Assessments will be due by March 1, 2021. Due to the unusual circumstances of this year and out of respect for everyone's financial situations, you may pay your assessment obligation in monthly payments, starting now-thru March. BUNDLES FOR BRITIAN By Katherine Yamada

Last month's article about Oakmont's early years brought a couple of questions about our members' involvement with 'Bundles for Britain.'

Bundles for Britain started in 1940 - - thanks to a woman who has gone down in history simply as 'Mrs. Latham.' She was inspired to organize a knitting circle in a storefront in New York City. Now, I don't know what kind of store it was, but can't you just see a group of women with the leisure time available to engage in knitting in the afternoon - - - instead of cooking, cleaning, looking after children and going to the market.

These women knitted socks, gloves, hats, sweaters, and scarves and Latham (who must have had a lot of connections) found a way to get them shipped off to Britain.

The knitting circles were an instant hit. In the days before social media, when ideas spread through face to face conversations, letters, phone calls, newspapers and yes, telegrams, Bundles for Britain exploded! Soon there were 975 branches and almost a million contributors.

By the spring of 1941, these knitters had delivered 40,000 sleeveless sweaters, 10,000 sweaters with sleeves, 30,000 scarves, 18,000 pairs of 'sea boot' stockings, 50,000 pairs of socks, and 8,000 caps.

And they didn't stop there. By 1941, Bundles had also shipped ambulances, surgical instruments, medicines, cots, blankets, field-kitchen units, and operating tables, along with used clothing of all sorts. The total value of goods shipped reached \$1,500,000.

Another \$1,000,000 was raised in cash.

One way of raising cash to ship these items overseas was thru the sale of mementos. According to Wikipedia, the most common items were button lapel pins displaying the British War Relief emblem. They came in two sizes: large brooches for women, and smaller pins for men. In 1941, the pins were sold for \$2.50 and \$1 respectively.

Other items included ceramics, books, stamps, celluloid badges, Cinderella's, (WHAT ARE THEY?) cigarette cases and compacts. Plus, local branches of the BWRS and Bundles for Britain produced their own matchbooks.

Mrs. Latham was later recognized for this wartime effort. King George VI himself made her an honorary Commander of the Order of the British Empire in 1946. She was the first non-British subject to receive this

honor.

Her story may have even served as inspiration for a Cary Grant movie 'Mr. Lucky.' I looked that movie up on Wikipedia and read the plot - it involves Grant as a 'shady gambler' and Loraine Day as a wealthy socialite and was inspired by a 1942 article in Cosmopolitan Magazine about - you guessed it - - Bundles For Freedom. So can we deduce from that article that Mrs. Latham was a wealthy socialite?

Well, turns out that in 1953, Mrs. Latham married for the fourth time: to Lord Malcolm Douglas-Hamilton. So that should indicate that, yes indeed, she was a wealthy socialite.

There's another movie and another connection: The song "Thumbs Up!" (aka "British Delivers the Goods"), composed in 1941 by Moe Jaffe, Jack O'Brien, and Bert Lee, was the official theme song of the British War Relief Society. The song became the theme and movie title for the 1943 film, 'Thumbs Up.'

My good friend Wikipedia informs me that 'Thumbs Up' is a 1943 American musical drama film directed by Joseph Santley and starring Brenda Joyce, Richard Fraser and Elsa Lanchester. For a publicity stunt to boost her career, an American nightclub singer volunteers for a stint in a British munitions factory. She is so impressed by the spirit of her fellow workers that she decides to stay on.

Alas, I can't find either one of these movies on my Netflix account. And TCM doesn't seem to have them either.....
